

# Oropharyngeal Airway

Oropharyngeal airways (OPA) are used for short term airway management in the unconscious paediatric patient.

1

## GATHER EQUIPMENT

Gather equipment pictured below

## PREPARE

Attend to hand hygiene and don PPE

## PROCEDURE

Position the child appropriately to access the nose



4

Measure for the correct size OPA from the central incisors to the angle of the jaw.

Use a tongue depressor to help move the tongue out of the way.



6

Insert the OPA with the concave surface to the tongue under direct vision. If the patient gags remove the OPA as the patient is not tolerating it and this increases the risk of vomiting.



7

Document the size of the OPA inserted and reassess its effectiveness. If the patient had an oxygen mask on prior to procedure then re-apply oxygen as required.



## ALERT

An OPA of the incorrect size may inadvertently cause an airway obstruction.

Seek prompt senior nursing/medical advice for assistance in paediatric airway management.

## Tips in children

- Do not twist, turn or invert the OPA in an infant or child as this can damage their soft palate
